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Anti-Aging Products Much Like Magical Beans. Really Expensive Ones.

Ok, really, ladies. We must stop buying beauty products called "biodynamic lifting cream" for \$300 an ounce. Seriously. Despite the fact that "the efficacy of these products is difficult, if not impossible, to measure," the anti-aging product market is raking in about \$2 billion a year writes the Wall Street Journal **today**. "For many of these ingredients, nobody's ever done independent clinical trials to see whether these things are effective," Daniel Behroozan, clinical instructor of dermatology at UCLA, told the Journal. And you know what that means! "Suppliers are getting more aggressive about pushing prices higher and higher," says the paper. Like a "1-ounce skin serum containing gold particles" that goes for \$525. Or a \$350 bottle of serum "containing extracts from cured Sauvignon grapevines."
